### HOLE-IN-THE-ROCK IS GOAL OF THE CHAPTER'S JANUARY TRIP TO UTAH

On January 26, 1880, 250 Mormon settlers lowered 83 wagons and drove several hundred head of cattle down a precipitous 1000 foot chasm to cross the Colorado River. Horses were hitched behind the wagons and wheels were locked to slow descent. The site became known as Hole-in-the-Rock.

We will join the fifth annual commemoration of this event January 26 and 27. In addition to the all day boat trip Saturday, January 27 on Lake Powell to the Hole-in-the-Rock, there will be programs given by authors and historians, Dr. C. Gregory Crampton and Lamont Crabtree at 6:30 pm, Friday evening, January 26. They will also accompany the group on Saturday.

Enclosed you will find a flyer explaining the details of registering for the January trip. There is a package rate at Wahweap Lodge of \$79 per person, which includes two night's lodging and the boat trip. There is also a campground available. You are urged to arrive in time for the program on Friday evening as it will increase your knowledge and enjoyment on Saturday. Also please note that you need to make your own reservations. This is an opportunity to hear about an emigrant event and see the site of it, besides experiencing the beauty of Lake Powell. Jack Root said that at last year's event, the boat also stopped at Rainbow Bridge, hopefully, that remains a possibility. Weather can vary from quite pleasant to chilly at that time of the year, so come prepared.

#### BUTTERFIELD SITES WELL WORTH THE TRIP

The first weekend in November was our field trip planned by the Carters in Las Cruses, NM. Jim rented a van so we just sat back and left the driving to him!

It was nippy start of a beautiful day on Saturday morning when we headed for the fairgrounds, our first stop. We met Jerry McDonald, a Paleontologist who has unearthed a variety of animal trackways, left in an ancient muddy shoreline. He is gradually reconstructing the 280 million year old layers taken from the original site to a building at the fairgrounds. It was very impressive and will be written up in a spring issue of National Geographic.

Next were several of the Butterfield Stage stops in central New Mexico, including Rough & Ready, Goodsight and Cooke's Spring. We also stood on the hilltop where Whipple's boundary marker for the US/Mexican border was put in before the Gadsden purchase. At Cooke's Spring, we also saw the adobe remains of Fort Cummings, including the graveyard. All of these sites were miles from anywhere, looking just as remote as they did when used by the stages and emigrants. There were several local experts along with us to explain what we were seeing, and that added to our understanding.

We broke up the travel with lunch in

the city park at Deming. Carters had arranged to have sub sandwiches made up special for us and they were very good, and very large! No one went away hungry.

After a flat tire and a quick change by the wagon master and passengers on our way back to Las Cruses, we met for dinner at La Posta in Mesilla. This wonderful Mexican restaurant is the site of another of the stage stops. We met after dinner at Carter's home for dessert and business meeting.

Sunday morning we were off again, stopping to see the Picacho station site, and another boundary marker. There was also an unscheduled stop for purchase of chili strings, fresh from the fields. The final stop was at Fort Seldon, now a state park. It is quite well preserved and well worth the stop.

As we all scattered for home, we felt again that we had seen and experienced a bit of history. Our thanks to Jim and Marion Carter for all the planning that went into this successful outing. What a great way to spend a beautiful fall weekend!

This also reminded us again that the trails we study here in Arizona were usually going through our state, to and from other locations.

#### LET'S GET ACQUAINTED

This issue profiles Harland Tompkins, another of the chapter's charter members. Harland is in his early fifties, a staff scientist at Motorola in Mesa, though he lives in Chandler.

Born and raised in Williamstown, Missouri, he and wife, Rose Ann, left that state after undergraduate school to live in a variety of places including Hawaii, Kentucky, Wisconsin, Ohio, Idaho, Texas and Arizona. A Navy ROTC commission got him to Pearl Harbor, job opportunities and graduate school account for other moves. He has a PhD in Physics from the Univ. of Wis.-Milwaukee, and he does research on surfaces and thin films. He also teaches short courses for the American Vacumn Society in various parts of the country.

He and Rose Ann have two children, Andrew, an USAF Officer, and Ellen, a CPA. They have one granddaughter, with another grandchild expected soon.

Among his interests, he lists skiing, travel, photography, computers, history and exploring the backroads with his 4WD. He joined OCTA in 1986 and attended the Boise convention. He was the program chairman for our symposium last June and has attended most of our field trips.

#### BEALE ROAD RESEARCH CONTINUES

In anticipation of the April field trip to the Kingman, AZ area to see traces of the Beale Road, I thought it might be appropriate to explain to the chapter members the status of our research on this early "highway" across the state. Harland and I became interested in the Beale Road after Aubrey Haines led a field trip to El Morro, NM in April of '87 (the famous snowstorm trip).

Edward F. Beale (1822-1893) figured in several chapters of United States history. He was considered one of the heroes of the Battle of San Pasqual; he carried the first gold samples to the east in 1848, starting the California Gold Rush; he held several positions in California politics and owned the large Rancho El Tejon in that state; he experimented with camels as pack animals in the west while constructing the federally financed wagon road from Fort Smith to the Colorado River; and he was later active in Washington politics, which included being the minister to Austria-Hungary. It would seem that he was one of those men who influenced many areas, but never became a legend like his contemporaries, Fremont and Carson. The wagon road was used for many years by emigrants, miners, cattle-men and military groups as one extension of the Santa Fe Trail into California. It was later roughly followed by the railroad and Route 66 through Arizona.

As our interest in Beale and his wagon road grew, we began gathering resource material, books, government reports, journals and maps. We made contact with two people in Kingman and one person in Flagstaff who had information about locations of the road. The chapter decided that we would attempt to survey and map the road for OCTA's emigrant trail mapping program, and Gary Keller, as coordinator of that project, acquired some of the appropriate topographic maps from OCTA.

Last July we spent a weekend in Kingman, meeting with Loren Wilson and Ed Edwards. They took us to various sites in the area, and shared their knowledge of the road in Mohave County. We visited Beale Springs, later an army post, Sitgreaves Pass, and other places with

road remnants. It is our hope that both will be available as guides for our April outing.

We have also gone to Flagstaff on two weekends to meet with Jack B. Smith. He has researched the road for years and has been marking it in the Kaibab and Coconino National Forest for the Forest Service. He showed us a number of sites and road traces both east and west of Flagstaff, including Leroux Spring, Turkey Tanks, some register rocks, and camping areas used along the road. Hopefully, Mr. Smith will be available at some future time for another field trip in the Flagstaff area.

I am currently working on organizing the various journals into a format for comparison purposes, to help locate sites, and to increase our understanding about how the road was used. I have only a few actual emigrant accounts, so any additional information you might be aware of would be appreciated.

Future plans include more chapter field trips (some of this area can be visited when it is too hot elsewhere in the state), mapping the road for OCTA, and hopefully the offering of a rendezvous by the fall of 1991.


